

# Prevent Duty Risk Assessment 2024/2025

- The aim of the Prevent strategy is to reduce the threat to the UK from terrorism by stopping people being drawn into terrorism.
- We are required to take a risk-based approach to the Prevent duty, under paragraph 14 of the Home Office's <u>statutory guidance</u>.
- This document demonstrates our awareness of the specific risks of extremism and radicalisation in our school and our area.
- **Extremism** is defined as vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. Extremism isn't exclusive to any section of society and can take many forms.
- Radicalisation is defined as the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and extremist ideologies associated with terrorist groups.
- Risk levels are graded 1 (low) to 5 (high)

Pupils use the school network or school hardware to access extremist material	Pupils	<ul> <li>Our online safety/IT/child protection policy makes reference to the risks of online extremist material.</li> <li>Pupils are encouraged to report any material they come across online which makes them worried or uncomfortable.</li> <li>IT safety and monitoring systems, for example:</li> <li>The school IT network has appropriate filters to block sites deemed inappropriate or unsafe</li> <li>School email accounts are monitored by IT staff</li> <li>The school IT filter alerts safeguarding staff when certain terms, phrases or words of an extremist nature are typed on any device that has access to the school network.
